ORDINANCE #2023 – 03
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE TEXT OF THE CLINTON COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE
TO UPDATE SECTION 4.2.18.

Section 1: Be it enacted by the Clinton County Board of Supervisors that the text of the Clinton County Zoning Ordinance be amended as follows: See attached Exhibit “A”

Section 2: The change as hereinabove set forth shall be entered and made part of the Zoning and Ordinance of the County of Clinton, Iowa.

Section 3: If any section, provision or part of this Ordinance shall be adjudged to be invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 4: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and publication as required by law.

Exhibit “A”

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE TEXT OF THE CLINTON COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE TO
UPDATE SECTION 4.2.18.

1. Amend Ordinance 2016-03 by adding following sections 4.2.18.G with the following:

General

1. The Project shall be kept and maintained in good repair and condition at all times: neat, clean, and free of refuse, waste or unsightly, hazardous or unsanitary conditions.

Setbacks

2. The Project shall maintain a minimum distance of 300 feet between all habitable structures and the Project’s solar panels. Landowners may waive all or part of this setback if they choose.

3. The Project shall maintain a minimum distance of 100 feet between the U.S. Highway 30 right-of-way and all aboveground project infrastructure.

Landscape Buffering

4. The Project shall install and maintain landscape buffering along adjacent, non-participating residential parcels, if requested by the adjacent, non-participating residential parcel owner, at a rate of at least six (6) trees per one hundred (100) feet. For the avoidance of doubt, the landscape buffering would be located along the sides of any adjacent, nonparticipating residential parcels that abut the Project. The trees shall be sufficient size at planting to reach 8 feet within 3 years, and the Project shall promptly replace any diseased or dead trees. There shall be an annual review of buffer trees and landscaping.

5. The Project will use commercially reasonable efforts to locate trees as far from adjacent, nonparticipating residential property lines as practicable.

Local Employment

6. The Project shall hold a local job fair and shall make a good faith effort to hire local employees to construct and maintain the Project. The Project shall track and report annually to the Clinton County Board of Supervisors the number of local employees hired.

Soil and Water Sampling

7. The Project shall submit a Soil and Water Sampling plan to Clinton County prior to construction as part of the Zoning Permit and Final Site Plan approval process. The number of samples, sampling timing, and testing methodology shall be mutually agreed upon by the Project and the Clinton County Engineer.

Construction Hours

8. Construction laydown areas shall be located in a manner to minimize impacts to nonparticipating residences and shall be set back at least 500 feet from nonparticipating residences.

9. Construction hours shall be daylight hours, not earlier than 7am and not later than 7pm, Monday through Saturday. For this purpose, construction does not include meetings of crews or operation of cars, light trucks, or forklifts. Exceptions to this shall be made on a case-by-case basis by the Clinton County Zoning Director.

Road Use and Repair

10. The Project shall enter into a Road Use and Repair Agreement with Clinton County prior to construction satisfactory to the Clinton County Engineer.

11. The Project shall conduct a pre-construction survey in coordination with the County Engineer to determine the condition of existing roads and drainage structures. The survey shall include photographs and a written agreement to document the condition of the public facility.
12. Clinton County shall provide on-going road maintenance and dust control measures deemed appropriate at the expense of the applicant utilizing their standard rates charged to cities within the county.
13. The Project shall be responsible for restoring or paying damages as agreed to by the County Engineer sufficient to restore the road(s) and bridges to preconstruction conditions.
14. Financial security shall be submitted before construction covering up to 100% of estimated cost for repairs as agreed to by the Project and the County Engineer.

Decommissioning

15. Decommissioning of the Project shall include removal of all project infrastructure, including underground installations, and shall include the restoration of the grounds and roads utilized to their condition prior to the removal of the infrastructure.
16. The Project shall submit an updated Decommissioning Plan to Clinton County prior to construction as part of the Zoning Permit and Final Site Plan approval process.
17. The Decommissioning Plan shall include a decommissioning cost estimate prepared by a state licensed professional engineer.
18. The estimated decommissioning cost, less any resale and salvage value, shall be guaranteed in one of the following forms: (i) surety bond obtained from a surety authorized by the Iowa Insurance Commissioner, (ii) cash to be held in escrow by the County Treasurer at a Bank, or (iii) a letter of credit from a financial institution reasonably acceptable to the County which shall be irrevocable unless replaced with cash or other form of security reasonably acceptable to County. The initial bond amount shall be the amount set in the project application. The form, source and amount of bond shall be approved by the county board of supervisors.
19. The Project shall provide the decommissioning cost guaranty before the start of construction and shall maintain the financial security thereafter for as long as each is in existence or upon discontinuance, decommissioning, or abandonment prior to completion.
20. The Project shall revise and update the decommissioning cost estimate every five (5) years from the date of approval to account for inflation, cost and value changes, and advances in decommissioning technologies and approaches over the life of the project.
21. If Clinton County disputes the decommissioning cost estimate provided by the Project, the estimate shall be reviewed by a mutually agreed upon third party engineer.

RE Overlay District Term

22. The Renewable Energy Overlay District shall expire after the earlier of (a) completion of decommissioning of the Project, or (b) forty-one (41) years following the commercial operation date of the Project. 41 years would account for the 40-year maximum operational period under lease agreements and the 1 year decommissioning period.

Insurance

23. The Project shall at all times during construction and operation of the project maintain a broad general liability insurance policy commensurate with industry standards. Certificates of insurance shall be provided to Clinton County upon request. The Project shall name Clinton County as an additional insured under said insurance. The Project shall indemnify and hold Clinton County and its employees, agents and representatives free and harmless from any third party claims for damages to property directly caused by the Project arising from the installation, operation, and decommissioning of the project; provided, however, such indemnification obligation shall not apply if such damage was caused by Clinton County or any of its employees, agents or representatives.

Fire Safety

24. The Project shall coordinate with emergency services staff to provide materials, education and/or training to the departments serving the property with emergency services.
25. The Project shall provide the Grand Mound Volunteer Fire Department and Calamus Volunteer Fire Department all pertinent information in case of a fire or other emergency on site to ensure safe operation and emergency response, including but not limited to specific training, 24-hour contact information, access to lock boxes (e.g. Knox Boxes), access point locations, the locations of shut offs and circulation patterns. The Project shall update the fire departments of any changes to such information and provide an annual tour for any new fire department volunteers. The Project shall provide, at the Project's sole cost, any equipment, keys, or codes as necessary for the fire departments to gain entry to the site in the event of an emergency.

Assignment

26. Any instrument assigning ownership or control of the Project shall include express language requiring any future owners of the Project to construct, maintain, and operate the Project in compliance with all Clinton County requirements, unless modified by a condition of this approval. For the avoidance of doubt, these requirements include the decommissioning and site restoration obligations and road use and repair obligations. If there is a change in ownership, the Project shall notify the Clinton County Planning and Zoning Director within 30 days of any such transfer, assignment, or sale.

Drainage

27. The Project shall be responsible for maintaining the integrity of the drainage system so as not to cause drainage issues within the project area or on neighboring properties.
28. The Project shall be responsible for reasonably prompt repair of damage to public drainage systems stemming from construction, operation or maintenance. In the event of impacts to public drainage systems within the project footprints, the Project shall ensure that this does not affect neighboring properties. There shall be in place at all times a defined procedure for the county to notify the applicant of any drainage issue. In the event the applicant fails to take or make a prompt effort to address the same, the county may at the applicant's expense act to correct the situation.
29. If drainage infrastructure or systems on non-participating properties are damaged by any cause connected with the project, the Project shall restore the drainage infrastructure or system to a condition at least as good as the pre-construction condition.

Soils

30. Top soils shall not be removed during development, unless as part of a remediation effort. If removed, the full depth of topsoil shall be replaced.
31. Soils shall be planted and maintained in deep rooted perennial vegetation to prevent erosion, manage runoff and build soil. Seeds should include a mix of grasses and wildflowers, ideally native to the region of the Project site that will result in a short stature prairie with a diversity of forbs or flowering plants that bloom throughout the growing season.
32. Seed mixes and maintenance practices should be consistent with recommendations made by qualified natural resource professionals such as those from the Department of Natural Resources, County Soil and Water Conservation Service, or Natural Resource Conservation Service.

DEPARTMENT HEADS, ELECTED OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES

Supervisor George said she will be attending a meeting today with Matt Brooke and council members from the City of Clinton, County Sheriff, Clinton Police Chief and concerned members of the public to address problem properties in the city that are possible drug houses. She said the residents said they feel unsafe in their homes. George said the Expansion huddle that was scheduled for last week was cancelled.

Chairman Irwin shared he spoke to Todd Noack of Life Connections Peer Recovery Services and his office will be moving from DeWitt to the Clinton at 1663 Lincolnway. He said this is a better location with it being on a bus route and this will help to service a larger population. Noack has contracted with Amerigroup for additional services. He said the ribbon cutting and open house is tomorrow at 1:00 p.m. Irwin added he has an ISAC presentation in August as he is part of the Workforce Development board panel. He also mentioned that this weekend is Rustic Days in Lost Nation and also activities in Charlotte with a side-by-side ride.

Supervisor Srp had a good week attending community events. He said the City of Low Moor had a nice event and he is looking forward to all the family friendly activities around the county.

County Sheriff Greenwalt said all the parades over the holiday went well, great crowds and lots of participation. Srp added it was nice to see a Sheriff's car in the car show in Low Moor to help them set a new record. Greenwalt said Goose Lake had a fire department BBQ cookoff, again great participation. He is meeting in Charlotte with the fire department to discuss the First Responder ride that already has 440 pre-registered side-by-sides for that event.

Srp said we are two weeks out from the county fair so that is another great event.

County Facilities Director Corey Johnson asked if the board members would be available on Wednesday for a zoom meeting with Modus and Origin Design to go over the results and explain their findings of the mechanical study for the Administration building. Johnson will schedule the meeting and notify the Supervisors.

Kinney asked about the Board of Supervisors meeting next week at the County fairgrounds and if they wanted him to provide an update on the Secondary Roads projects. He said he has a County Engineers mid-year conference meeting on the Thursday, July 13. He also said the week of July 23rd he has a low-volume roads conference in Cedar Rapids but he will be driving back and forth so he will be available if needed.

DISCUSSION WITH POSSIBLE ACTION

Severance of Territory from the City of Welton: Irwin said that no one from Welton is attending the meeting. He said that Welton is trying to give property back to the county instead of annexing. Srp said he would like to have more information and the story behind it. Srp said it is the land on south side of Humeston road but there are no services there so he would like more information. Irwin said he would follow up with Buzzy and Melissa. Srp said

he could also stop by to talk with Buzzy. Srp said the City of Welton council already approved the severance on April 11th of this year. Srp suggested that we speak to the County Attorney to get his comments on this issue. Irwin agreed and said that no action would be taken today and to add the discussion to the next Board meeting.

Clinton Humane Society and County Animals: Srp said the Board received a letter previously and had some discussion on the request for funding from the Humane Society. He said that historically, the county has not provided funding to the Humane Society since 2013 although the county has received requests for funding over the last 3 to 4 years. Srp said the previous sheriff had recommended against funding the requests because the county didn't have any ordinance in place to support or justify taking animals off the street. He said he knows there may be rare situations where if someone was attacked or injured by an animal, the county has a responsibility to address it but without the ordinance with language in place to state when animals should go to the Humane Society, the county decided not to support them. Srp said that over the past year, the Humane Society had asked that the county provide funding based on the number of animals brought in from parts of the county that are not contracting for services. He believes that Camanche, Clinton and Grand Mound may have contracts with Humane Society. Srp said it is hard to define where the animals are coming from.

Greenwalt said he received an email from the Humane Society stating effective July 1, 2023, they would no longer accept animals from the County unless the animal needed to be quarantined for 10 days because of a dog bite. He researched calls between July 2022 through June 2023 and there were 20 to 30 calls that involved dogs, but not all those calls resulted in dogs being taken to the Humane Society. He said in the event they do have a dog found along the highway now, they are not sure what they would do with the animal.

Srp said previously the county discussed providing some funding to the Humane Society but with the changes in the legislature's action to put caps on our levy authority for the future, will require reductions in the county budget. He said even if there were funds available now, he doesn't believe funding could be sustained in the future.

George asked if the Humane Society was open to a 'per animal per day' fee.

Greenwalt said he has not discussed anything with the Humane Society yet and wanted to see what direction the Board of Supervisors wanted to go. He said the City of DeWitt has their own facility. He is reaching out to the Board to see what they wanted him to do.

Irwin said the Board discussed a per animal fee during the budget process with the Humane Society but they never followed up with the Board of Supervisors. He said the Humane Society was asking for a \$15,000 funding from the County. Irwin said he has been in contact with Steve Linder, DeWitt City Administrator, to see if they could provide another option, something like a per day fee and if their facility has room for 2 or 4 animals.

Irwin asked Greenwalt how many of the calls for animals resulted in an animal taken to the Humane Society but that is not something that the Sheriff's Office tracks.

Srp asked if the proposed relationship with DeWitt would only be for our Sheriff's Office to drop off animals. Irwin confirmed that it would be just for animals dropped off by our Sheriff's Office and not available for the general public. He said his opinion is that rural residents will take care of the dog if there is no collar or any information on the animal. He would like to ask the Humane Society how they determine that the animal was dropped off by the Sheriff's Office and from a county resident. He said they do not have any proof that the person dropping the animal off was not from a city in the County.

Srp said he was in contact with the Humane Society in April and they said in the first 9 months of this fiscal year, they had 59 animals dropped off. For the fiscal year 2022, they indicated they had 84 animals dropped off. Srp said we offered the fee schedule as a 'per animal' but they didn't want us to cover just those dropped off by Sheriff's Office, they wanted the fee to be for all animals that they received. He said because there wasn't an ordinance in place, he was apprehensive about doing that.

Srp would like to talk with the Director of the Humane Society and renew a discussion about a fee for animals dropped off by the County Sheriff's Office only. Greenwalt said his recommendation would be to have a separate fee for his office. He would also need to establish a policy in his office as to what they would respond to. George agreed that there needs to be a policy.

Irwin asked for the discussion to be added to the next Board meeting. Srp said he will reach out to the Humane Society to discuss a fee for animals dropped off by the Sheriff's Office. He asked Greenwalt if he would like to go to the meeting as well. Srp also asked Greenwalt to discuss the issue with the County Attorney.
